SILDENAFIL (Revatio®, Viagra®)

What is sildenafil (Revatio[®], Viagra[®]) used for?

Sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) is a prescription medicine used to treat pulmonary arterial hypertension (PAH). PAH is defined by high blood pressure in the lungs resulting from the pulmonary arteries—the blood vessels that carry blood from the heart to the lungs—becoming narrowed or scarred.

How does it work?

Sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) is a phosphodiesterase 5 inhibitor (PDE-5 inhibitor) that lowers blood pressure in the lungs, making it easier for the heart to pump more effectively. Sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) prevents PDE-5 enzymes from degrading nitric oxide in the pulmonary arteries, which helps dilate the blood vessels. Taking this medication may improve your ability to exercise and slow disease progression.

What do I need to know?

Contraindications:

Do not take sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) if you:

- Have ever had an allergic reaction to sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) or any of its ingredients
- Have had a prior episode of non-arteritic anterior ischemic optic neuropathy (NAION)
- Are taking medications that contain nitrates in any form (oral, spray, sublingual, ointment, and/or patch)
- Are taking riociguat (Adempas®)

Sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) should be avoided in severe liver disease.

Important information:

Avoid grapefruit juice.

If you are pregnant or may become pregnant, contact your medical team right away.

Drug interactions

The following drugs may interact with sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®). Please note that this is not a comprehensive list of drug interactions.

Please speak to your medical team before starting any new medication.

Using sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®) with blood pressure medications can lead to low blood pressure in some patients.

Medicines for the treatment of fungal infections — e.g. ketoconazole (Apo-Ketoconazole®),

itraconazole (Sporanox®), and voriconazole (Vfend®)

Nitrates in any form — e.g. nitroglycerin spray, tablets, ointments, or patch, isosorbide dinitrate or mononitrate

Medicines for the treatment of HIV infection e.g. darunavir (Prezista®), ritonavir (Norvir®), nelfinavir (Viracept®), and saquinavir (Invirase®)

Antibiotics — e.g. erythromycin (Eryc[®]), clarithromycin (Biaxin®), telithromycin (Ketek®), and rifampin (Rofact®)

Medications for seizure disorders e.g. phenytoin (Dilantin®), and carbamazepine (Tegretol®)

Medications used to treat pulmonary hypertension and/or erectile dysfunction — e.g. riociguat (Adempas®), tadalafil (Adcirca®, Cialis®), and vardenafil (Levitra®)

Please Note:

Tell your medical team about ALL the medicines you are taking including minerals, natural supplements, and alternative medications.

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How should I take sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®)?

Take tablets three times a day, 6-8 hours apart, with or without food.

Missed dose:

If you miss a dose of sildenafil (Revatio[®], Viagra[®]), take your tablet as soon as you remember. Do not take two doses at the same time. If it is almost time for your next dose, skip the missed dose; just take the next dose at your regular time.

What are common side effects?

Some patients may experience side effects when taking this medication. If the side effects are severe or bothersome, please contact your medical team. Side effects may include:

- Headache
- Flushing
- Muscle aches
- Nasal congestion
- Indigestion and heartburn
- Blurred or impaired vision
- Sudden vision or hearing loss



When should I notify my PH clinic or seek medical attention?

Contact your medical team or seek medical attention immediately if you develop:

- Symptoms of worsening PH, including: difficulty breathing, fluid retention or weight gain, and/or dizziness or passing out
- · Sudden vision or hearing loss
- · Painful or prolonged erection
- An allergic reaction, including: swelling of the mouth, tongue, face, and throat; itching; rash; and/or difficulty breathing

If you take more than your prescribed dose, contact your medical team immediately, even if you feel well.

Do not stop taking sildenafil (Revatio®, Viagra®), unless advised by your medical team.

Additional information:

Do not throw away any medication via wastewater or household waste. Ask your pharmacist how to dispose of medications
